


The Battle Of The Bands

Emperor!

Marcus Aurelius, the great Roman emperor, visited the Year Three students at our school ahead of their topic unit on the Roman Empire. During his visit, he spoke about what life was like for Romans, highlighting the fact that most people were poor labourers while only a very few had power and wealth. Despite being born into wealth, Aurelius made it clear that money and power never interested him. Instead, he emphasised the importance of self-discipline, waking up early, self-improvement, studying, and exercising - values that he and other stoic philosophers considered vital for a fulfilling life.

Aurelius's talk was not only inspiring but also deeply moving. He shared the hardships he went through, including the loss of eight of his children, running the empire during the Antonine plague, and constantly fighting off invaders. His personal experiences left a lasting impression on the young students, teaching them that even great leaders face challenges and hardships in their lives.

The students were fascinated by the stories Aurelius shared and eagerly asked him questions about his life and leadership style. Aurelius encouraged them to always strive for self-improvement and to be disciplined in their approach to life.

Overall, the visit by Marcus Aurelius was a remarkable opportunity for the students to learn about the Roman Empire and its influential leaders. His talk encouraged the students to develop a growth mindset and embrace challenges in their own lives, just as he did during his reign as emperor. 
